Why this is a special place:

- One of the Trust's largest nature reserves.
- Important reserve for butterflies and moths including the Silver Washed Fritillary and Double Line Moth.
- Two-way marked nature trails; a long one at 3 km and a short one at 1 km.
- The larger grassland areas are grazed by Shetland ponies and have thousands of Heath Spotted Orchids in flower in June and fantastic displays of Devil's Bit Scabious in late August.

Langford Heathfield Nature Reserve is a 226 acre (91.6 hectare) Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). It comprises areas of heathy grassland, Bracken, Willow and Birch scrub and Oak and Ash woodland.



Species Rich Common Land


Much of the reserve is common land over which several local properties have the ancient rights of pasturage (grazing), turbary (turf cutting) and estovers (woodcutting for fencing and firewood). The public also have rights of access to the common.

Because of the damp conditions and common status of the reserve, it was not reclaimed or improved for agriculture, thus enabling the survival of many important wildlife species. Plants present include Sneezewort, Meadow Thistle, Petty Whin, Pale Heath Violet, Early Purple and Heath Spotted Orchids. Around thirty butterfly species have been recorded including notables such as the Small Pearl Bordered and Silver-Washed Fritillaries. The bird population is also diverse, and includes Tree Pipit, Woodcock and Sparrowhawk.



Most of the reserve was purchased in 1982 with Coram's Wood and Lucas's Conservation and numerous individuals. provides a healthy shrub layer.

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
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
