Church of St Laurence, Priddy



The Church of St Laurence, Priddy is making progress in increasing the value of their churchyard for wildlife. They have two wildflower areas which host a variety of wildflower species, including cowslip, common knapweed, bird'sfoot-trefoil, lady's bedstraw and betony.

Actions we have taken to conserve and/or increase the value of our churchyard for wildlife

We have two wildflower areas which started out as grassland with many species already present but previously closely mown throughout the summer. They are now allowed to flower and seed every year and are cut and managed appropriately with cuttings removed.



How we have raised awareness in our community

The original project involved many people from the community, and there is support for the continued management of the wildlife areas. Visitors to the area find the wildflower areas peaceful and inspirational.

Key lessons we have learnt

- Be realistic about what you can achieve with the people and resources you have
- Start with smaller, easily managed projects increasing the value of the churchyard to wildlife takes time and effort
- Engage as broadly as possible with the community if you start with too much ambition you may find people drop by the wayside as too much commitment is required, and people have very busy lives!
