St John the Baptist Brewham



St John the Baptist in Brewham are well established, working with Caring for God's Acre to increase the value of the churchyard for nature. They have a great variety of meadow flowers which benefit an array of wildlife which has been seen in the churchyard. They have recently formed a group to support and help members of the community who want to get involved.

Actions we have taken to conserve and/or increase the value of our churchyard for wildlife

- Cutting and removing the grass in late summer
- · Cutting the grass or grazing with sheep in early spring
- Encourage established plants, and adding plug plants grown from seed
- Established yellow rattle to reduce vigorous grass
- Increased the number of snowdrops (donated by local people)
- Added reptile mats
- Saved two veteran yew trees from being felled in 2005
- Created a rough area along a wall where brambles, hemp agrimony and other taller plants grow, which benefit mammals, birds and insects
- Leave ant hills instead of removing
- Cut paths to allow shorter areas of grass and access around churchyard

How we have raised awareness in our community

- Report to the Parish Council (they are responsible for this area of the churchyard)
- Occasional letters and pictures in the Parish Magazine
- A **notice board** by the gate explaining it is a wildlife area
- Formed a group to support and help meeting once a month to work and enjoy a cup of tea and cake

Key lessons we have learnt

- Cutting and removing grass is vital
- Sheep grazing in the winter and early spring has helped to reduce the work and people like to see them there
- Community try to get more people involved and visiting the area
- Cut wide paths through the grass so that people can walk together, and it looks cared for
- Provide benches for visitors to sit and enjoy the flowers and wildlife
